The Framework Agreement...

...is a government-to-government agreement between First Nations and Canada.



...recognizes First Nation power to enact land laws, and grant interests and licences on First Nation land.



FRAMEWORK AGREEMENT on First Nation Land Management

Dismantling of the *Indian*Act by replacing 44 land
management related
sections

Recognizes the First Nations' governing power over their lands, resources and environment


Reserves that become First Nation land continue to be lands reserved for FNs under s.91(24) of the *Constitution Act*, 1867 Re-establish First Nation land governance – Canada no longer has authority to manage or administer First Nation land once a land code comes into effect



FRAMEWORK AGREEMENT SIGNATORY First Nations across Canada

204 First Nations have signed onto the Framework Agreement since 1996


> 105 First Nations are currently implementing a land code 3 have gone onto Self-Governing Agreements


Readiness?

Welcome letter and Framework Agreement on First Nation Land Management <u>Adhesion</u> sent to First Nation

Framework Agreement on First Nation Land Management adhesion signed by Chief and Minister


Developmental Phase Funding Agreement signed by the First Nation, Indigenous Services Canada, and Resource Centre

Developmental Process begins





DEVELOPMENTAL PHASE FUNDING AGREEMENT (DPFA)



Sets out roles, responsibilities, milestones and funding for First Nations over 2 Years (may be extended) Amount is \$165,572 in developmental funding.

ANNEX A

Sets out the milestones which the First Nation must complete to proceed to a vote of their Land Code and Individual Agreement

ANNEX B

Outlines the roles and responsibilities of the parties

ANNEX C

Sets out the funding the Resource Centre will provide towards completing milestones

*Additional Funding may be available for items not funded under this agreement.








FRAMEWORK AGREEMENT DEVELOPMENTAL PROCESS





LAND CODE

ESTABLISHES A SYSTEM OF GOVERNANCE AND ADMINISTRATIVE RULES OF LAND MANAGEMENT FOR THE RESERVE LANDS



- Description of Lands
- Use and occupancy rules and procedures
- Rules and procedures for land revenues
- Requirements for accountability to members
- Law making procedures and publication
- Conflict of interest rules
- Dispute resolution process
- Rules for granting or expropriating interests

- Delegation of Council authority
- Procedures for amendments and land exchanges
- Could include:
 - Power of Council to make laws
 - Limitations to rights and interests
 - encumbering, seizing, or executing interest



COMMUNITY RATIFICATION PROCESS

THE COMMUNITY DECIDES THE VOTING METHODS AND DETERMINE THRESHOLDS FOR APPROVAL AND PARTICIPATION

- Developed by each First Nation
- Include established community voting procedures
- Does not require community approval but guides the community ratification process
- First Nation hires the ratification officer

- Every eligible voter 18 yrs + as of last voting day must have the opportunity to freely vote
- Inclusive of on/off reserve voters
- In person polling stations, mail in ballots or electronic voting









INDIVIDUAL AGREEMENT

Developed jointly by a First Nation and Canada and requires member approval by vote

- The Individual Agreement (IA) has advanced over the last 25+ years of implementation and legal review
- Specifies the transfer of the administration of land from Canada to a First Nation
- The individuality of a First Nation is represented in the Annexes of the Individual Agreement

Operational Stage Funding/Support

Should the First Nation vote **yes** on the Land Code and Individual Agreement, the First Nation will become operational.

- **OPERATIONAL FUNDING** is provided by Canada and negotiated by the LAB in a MOU Category's 1-5 based on a number of factors (land transactions, land base, population etc.) For Example: Category 1: \$280,508 for 2021-2022 with 1% inflation increases, 2022-2023 \$283,313
- **TRANSITIONAL FUNDING** is additional funding available for the first 2 years, in the total amount of \$150,000 (\$75,00 per year) for newly operational communities.
- OPERATIONAL SUPPORT is provided at no charge to the First Nation from the RC


