



The Framework Agreement...

...is a government-togovernment agreement between First Nations and Canada.



...gives First Nations the power to enact land laws, and grant interests and licences on First Nation land.



Framework Agreement on First Nation Land Management



Dismantling of the *Indian Act* by replacing 44 land management related sections

Recognizes the lands related governmental authority of First Nations

Reserves that become First Nation land continue to be lands reserved for FNs under s.91(24) of the *Constitution Act*, 1867

Re-establish First Nation land governance – Canada no longer has authority to manage or administer First Nation land once a land code comes into effect



Identifying Land Code Authorities

Land Code	Section	Authority			
PART 1 - PRELIMINARY MATTERS	3.2	The authority of the First Nation to govern its Land and resources flows from the Creator to the people of the First Nation, and from the people to Council according to the culture, traditions, customs and laws of the First Nation.			
PART 2 - FIRST NATION LEGISLATION	6.1	 Council may, in accordance with this Land Code, make Land laws respecting: the development, conservation, protection, management, use and possession of Name First Nation Land; Interests and Licences in relation to Name First Nation Land; and any matter necessary or ancillary to the making of Land laws in relation to the Name First Nation Land. 			
PART 3 - LAND ADMINISTRATION	22.1	Council may delegate administrative authority to staff to carry out functions necessary for day to day administrative operations of Land and natural resources.

 - Mapping resources





Advise Council and First Nation staff on matters respecting First Nation Land Recommend to Council Laws, Resolutions, policies and procedures respecting First Nation Land

Hold regular and special meetings of Members to discuss First Nation Land issues and make recommendations to Council on the resolution of such issues

Assist in the exchange of information regarding First Nation Land matters between Members

Oversee community consultations under your Land Code

Perform such other duties and functions as Council may direct

<u>T'Sou-ke Land Code Effective Date:</u> February 10th, 2006 <u>Lands Committee (LC):</u>

- 11 eligible voters are elected to LC
- 1 member of Council appointed, 1 eligible voter appointed by Council and the Lands Manager
- 2-year terms

Established under sec.25&26 of Land Code to:

- Assist with development of land administration system;
- Advise Council & staff on matters respecting land;
- Recommend to Council Laws, Resolutions, policies, and procedures respecting land;
- Hold regular & special meetings of Members on land issues and make recommendations to Council on resolution of such issues;
- Assist in the exchange of information regarding land issues between Members and Council;
- Oversee community approvals under Land Code;
- Anything else that Council may direct.
