

Introduction



- Previous TMPD webinars have included presentations on the scope of First Nation authority to make COVID-19 laws
- ➤ As stated previously, all governments are grappling with the fallout from the COVID-19 pandemic
- There is no one size fits all approach for First Nation governments or any other governments around the world

COVID-19 Law Making Authority - Summary

- More detailed description of COVID-19 law making authority was provided in previous webinars which can be found at https://labrc.com/land-governance-tools/resources/
- ➤ In summary, land code First Nations can make COVID-19 by-laws under the Indian Act as well as under the Framework Agreement, or even use both powers
- Check your land code to see if Council has authority to make temporary/urgent laws, if not it may take a few months to enact a law
- Over time, there is the option of enacting a broader Emergency Management Law covering a wide variety of emergency situations and to deal with the evolving COVID-19 pandemic under that authority





COVID-19 Laws – The Pandemic Continues



- ➤ In the spring of 2020, many land code First Nations enacted COVID-19 laws imposing strict standards typical of those undertaken by other governments in Canada (e.g. social distancing, maximum occupancy of buildings, etc.)
- ➤ First Nations can amend these laws as the pandemic evolves, even temporary/urgent land code laws can be amended if Council remains of the opinion that the situation is urgent
- > First Nations can amend these laws to track neighbouring standards as other governments change their standards or continue to set different standards if necessary



COVID-19 Laws – The Pandemic Continues (cont.)

- ➤ The next phase of First Nation COVID-19 laws, likely measures to better control outbreaks where the virus surges
- Consider new measures to restrict the kinds of gatherings which seem to spark virus surges (e.g. parties, crowded restaurants and bars, events attended by those eager to socialize)
- Consider new measures such as contact tracing, who should have responsibility/authority for contact tracing at your First Nation?
- Consider new measures such as quarantine requirements for those arriving from COVID-19 hotspots
- Plan for the likely resurgence this fall, consider contacting neighbouring governments to discuss their plans for the fall and perhaps even management of an eventual vaccine



COVID-19 Laws – Ongoing Engagement & Education



- Urgent COVID-19 laws have the advantage of speed but initially there might be some opposition, it is important to plan for ongoing community engagement and awareness
- Recommend using summer to test and refine an immediate response strategy, what are the first things to do if COVID-19 cases arise
- ➤ Health experts can advise but from a lands perspective, where will a COVID-19 response be managed, e.g. re-purposing community buildings





Enforcement Update

- ➤ See our earlier webinars, in particular the need for precision regarding the powers of officials to enforce COVID-19 laws
- The RC can assist with enforcement but rather than prosecution of offences, education and enlisting supportive community leaders is the most effective strategy
- ➤ Public Safety Canada and the RCMP have issued <u>National Guidelines</u> for enforcement of <u>COVID-19 Indian Act by-laws</u> but the Guidelines currently exclude COVID-19 laws under land codes
- ➤ The RC can assist if your First Nation wants to support the written objections some First Nations have sent to Canada regarding this restriction


