- Explore the authority under the Framework Agreement in respect of climate-related plans, laws and targets
- Promote climate-informed Framework Agreement related planning and climate mitigation and adaptation strategies
- Share success stories from other communities in responding to the climate emergency, and hear from experts in climate science





Self-governance and control over lands, resources, law development and enforcement is an essential element in ensuring First Nations can respond effectively to a rapidly changing climate. This presentation will explore the governance tools available to signatories of the Framework Agreement and how they can assist with climate change mitigation and adaptation.

Indigenous people have an intimate relationship with the land. They are likely to bear the brunt of the climate crisis, yet have minimal access to resources to cope with these risks and impacts.





 Land Use Plan & Zoning Law (to guide climate-friendly development, promote efficiency and renewable energy)

 Environmental Assessment Law (to screen development proposals for climate and other environmental impacts)

 Environmental Protection Law (to ensure developments do not harm the environment)

 Greenhouse Gas Emissions Control Law (to set a cap on a communities greenhouse gas emissions, to require inventorying and reporting of GHG's, etc.) - note: may require an amendment to the FA

"Planning for Climate Resilience"

In order to plan for climate change, we need to understand the urgency, speed of change, and scope of projected impacts associated with climate change. The scale of humanity's collective response will have a direct effect on the severity of changes to Earth's climate and what communities need to plan for. Communities need to integrate planning so that adpartation is coordinated and founded in good governance.

Climate change is projected to intensify in Canada:



Warming in Canada will occur increase, as will at twice the rate of global warming



Precipitation will the risk of drought and water shortages



Increased likelihood of extreme weather events and wildfires



Sea level rise, coastal erosion and flooding, storm surges



Longer and more frequent Ice-free conditions in the of life, traditional Arctic and Atlantic knowledge and oceans

Training, Mentorship & Professional Development Overview of Knowledge Sharing Services

The Resource Centre (RC) is committed to assist operational communities in identifying their priorities, needs, and work planning for successful implementation of their Land Code. Under the Training, Mentorship and Professional Development (TMPD) strategy, the RC continues to develop and deliver fundmanetal and technical Lands Governance training under the Framework Agreement.

- Workshops RC continues to work towards providing future training and Lands Governmance capacity development under the Framework Agreement. Audiences will be advised as workshops and courses become available.
 - Information Workshops these sessions are intended to deliver general information and updates on specific topics that are of interest to our managers, directors and communities.
 - Learning Workshops where knowledge is directly delivered by selected experts in the subject matter field.
 - Focus groups small targeted groups derived from experienced FN participants that provide expertise towards a specific subject matter.
- Online Courses Online Courses are short courses that have been created on topics that are informed by key functions of a Lands Governance Director or a Lands Manager operating under the FA. These courses also have a supporting Workbook, presentation and supplemental resources that can be used in webinars and workshops. Courses are reviewed and updated periodically as laws and other content changes come into effect. There are presently over 45 online courses available, with several additional ones in development.
- Land Governance Manual (LGM) The LGM is a resource tool for operational First Nations. It provides extensive documentation, process support and guidance. It is available electronically through an APP format for Lands staff to reference as required. It plays a central role in the workshops and webinars and is regularly updated and refined based on First Nation successes, challenges and needs.
- **Knowledge Repository** A searchable repository of examples, cases, templates, recorded webinars and other tools is available to support operational First Nations. The ability to host online courses and sub section of the LGM in a searchable, electronic manner is central to the design philosophy of the strategy. Our website is being implemented along with other tools being considered, to allow for enhanced access to the repository.
- **Direct Community Support (1:1)** The RC staff are available to assist communities directly in identifying their priorities, needs, and work planning. If you are interested in this service we encourage you to contact us and we can set a time to discuss your needs and work to design specific workshops to provide capacity training for your community.
