
# **European Settlement, Treaty & Dispossession of FN Land**

- 1600's First Reserve Established
- Peace and Friendship Treaties
- The Royal Proclamation, 1763
- Treaty's & Lands Set Apart
- Systematic dispossession of First Nation Land and Resources



## The Imposition of Colonialism


- Early Imperial Acts, Policy and Laws
- Sec. 91(24) of the *Constitution Act, 1867*
- The *Indian Act*, 1876, is the oldest Federal legislation governing First Nations in Canada
- The Act gave Canada the authority to legislate all matters concerning "Indians and lands reserved for Indians"
- The Act enabled Canada to exercise "exclusive jurisdiction' and control over FN life in areas, such as:
  - Introducing the Reserve System
  - Community Location
  - Lands and Resource Management
  - Forced Surrender of Reserve Lands
  - Expropriation
  - Vehicle of Assimilation, Colonization

#### INHERENT RIGHT TO GOVERN LANDS



 First Nations have continuously fought and stood against the forced colonization and the unlawful taking of land and resources

#### • Through:

- ✓ Land Claims
- ✓ Self-Government Agreements
- ✓ Sectoral Self Government Agreements
- First Nations are re-assuming their Inherent Rights to manage their lands and resources





The *Framework Agreement* is an historic Government-to-Government agreement signed on February 12, 1996 by 13 First Nations and Canada.

The purpose of the *Framework Agreement* is to enable First Nations to resume control over their lands and resources without Canada's interference.

This is the only time in Canada's history that a group of First Nations have joined together to design, negotiate and sign a government-to-government arrangement with the federal government to <u>resume their rightful jurisdiction</u>.

[April 13, 2012: 18 First Nations added as signatories to the FA in historic signing ceremony]



#### First Nation Lands & the Framework Agreement:

- No expropriation of reserve lands by Federal or Provincial governments
- Community control over Land
   Management and Development
- First Nations recognized as the decision-making authority over their reserve lands and resources
- Ability of First Nation to protect the environment

- AND Ensures:
- Canada continues to be liable for previous acts and omissions (E.G. Settlement of land claims)
- First Nation lands continue to be lands reserved for Indians within the meaning of section 91(24) of the Constitution Act, 1867


# UNITED NATIONS DECLARATION ON THE RIGHTS OF INDIGENOUS PEOPLES



Adopted by the United Nations on September 13, 2007

- Articles 3, 4 & 18 Self-Determination, Autonomy, Self-government and Decision-Making
- Article 19 Free Prior and Informed Consent
- Article 20 Maintain and develop political, economic and social systems or institutions
- Article 26, 27 & 28 Lands & Territory
- Article 37 Enforcement of Treaties

On June 16, 2021, the Senate officially passed **Bill C-15, an Act respecting** the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples






#### **RECLAMATION & REVITALIZATION**





FN governance has been interrupted for 150 years. What does reclamation look like? Where does it happen?



#### RESURGENCE & RESISTANCE: SOCIAL JUSTICE MOVEMENTS



- Response to historical (& current) lack of access to justice
- Social Media -> wider reach
- Current movements (fisheries, resource extraction, pipelines, Idle No More, Land back, MMIW, etc.)
- Opposing unilateral and colonial legislation
   & decision-making
- FN governance systems (constitutions, living our own world view, two eyed seeing, connecting past into the future, etc.)




