

- Introduced this collaboration at LAB Annual General Meeting, Oct. 2020
 Resolution #3 -Independent First Nation Land Registry
- Prepared a Plan of Work Required
- Organized a team to Design a New Land Registry System







Introduction to the LTSA


The <u>LTSA</u> is a publicly accountable, statutory corporation formed in 2005 responsible for administering the land title and survey systems of British Columbia

Independent from government; self-appointing board and selffunded

Statutory decision makers, operations, and technology management combined in a single organization ~ 180 employees

Operates multiple registries including new <u>Land Ownership</u> <u>Transparency Register</u>

Enhance economic and social foundations by aggregating data sources to improve decision making and inform public policy development.



Operational Context

Processes ~4.5 million online transactions annually:

- ~ 20% for the registration of land title interests
- ~ 80% for searches of registered records and issuance of certificates
- myLTSA: Gateway to search & filing (and other) services

Global leader in application of technology to land administration:

• Approximately 58% of all filings are auto-examined and registered

Award-winning innovation for mapping of survey cadastre

• ParcelMap BC: Digital submissions & survey-aware mapped representation











Demo of LTSA Technology for BC Land Titles

Purpose is to show-case LTSA technology

- Using live test system with non-current registry information
- Technology customised to meet requirements and process for BC Land Title Act
- Technology created and refined over 12+ years with significant investment
- Continually being improved over time

Prepare application for submission to BC Land Title office

- Application to assign a leasehold strata unit
- Role of para-legal preparing application on behalf of leaseholder
- Simplification of full LT application process

PROJECT GOAL



The ultimate goal for the LABRC National Land Registry project is to establish a single, complete, trusted, sustainable, and First Nations controlled land registry endorsed by First Nations for lands governed under a Land Code

Single

• Serves all participating First Nations within one registry whilst respecting the land registration autonomy of each First Nation

Complete

• Encompasses all registered rights, responsibilities and restrictions granted, inclusive of the corresponding boundary definition

Trusted

• Includes authoritative records using the existing regulatory framework that ensures the timely and accurate registration of instruments related to First Nations Lands

First Nations Control • Controlled and operated by a First Nations' organization and with the participation and guidance of stakeholders

Sustainable

 Operational framework is financially self-sustainable, maintained and enhanced over time



Current State – People, Services & Systems









Current State – Notable Findings so far (1)



1. Lack of written policy for FNLR

Inconsistent registration practices over time as people change.

2. Aging technology

- Dated user interfaces: somewhat awkward, not always intuitive.
- FNLRS not a true web app Citrix-based.

3. Issues with integration between survey records and registry records

- Two partially overlapping NRCan and Registry PIN schemes.
- Synchronization delays between SGB CLSS and eRIP.

4. Data issues

- Unsurveyed parcels with only textual descriptions missing from eRIP parcel map.
- Plans referenced that are not based on survey, i.e., just drawings.
- Less-than-accurate data from earlier times.
- Lack of data integrity mechanisms within FNLRS.





Current State – Notable Findings so far (2)



5. Land status difficult to determine

- Parcel Abstract Report and Reserve General Report mix active and historical interests.
- Land status must be determined manually and is complicated due to multiple parcel layers plus reserve.

6. FN authority not readily evident

- Possible to have submissions registered without consent of First Nation even though required.
- First Nation ownership of land and authority of Land Code not clearly evident in Parcel/Reserve Reports.

7. Pain points in existing processes

- Large effort required by ISC to redact instruments to meet Privacy Act requirements.
- No digital data feed out of land register for downstream First Nation systems, e.g., taxation.

8. Services not particularly customer-focused

- No formal Registry customer support services.
- Lacking continuous improvement practices to modernize land registry services and products.
