RC Planning Development & Implementation Funding Initiative

What we heard

- The RC can provide technical advice and support before the First Nation enters into a funding arrangement.
- First Nations are able to use the funding the RC provides however they see fit, provided the milestones are completed.
- There is funding and support available for both LUP Development and LUP Implementation.

LUP Development

What we heard

- Process to build your LUP, LUP build processes for the FN
- Community Engagement is a driving force of lands governance and First Nations are approaching this in innovative ways (Sumas FN)
- Member vs Non-Member Residential Zoning
- Open Zoning approach, Future Development Zoning
- Land Guardians and Monitoring of FN Lands (community safety, quality)

DAY 1: What we heard

Panel: Innovation in Land Use Planning Community Decision Making & First Nation Authority under Land Code

What we heard

- First Nations are working together to assert Jurisdiction and share best practices (Tess Sullivan Missanabie Cree, Land Symposium example)
- Agreements between jurisdictional governments (FN to FN, FN to Munic, FN to Prov/Fed) can help to assert jurisdiction
- FN are working together to enhance their leverage in situations
- FN should not be relied upon to move reconciliation forward, Non-FN governments have a responsibility to learn on their own time.

Panel: Innovation in Land Use Planning Technology Integration & Climate Resilience and Adaptive Planning

What we heard

- FNs are working to develop, own, and manage their own data.
- Tech tools are only as effective as the people who can operate and use them, considerations around having skilled staff people.
- Climate Change is the greatest threat to us and our LUPs need to reflect risks of impacts.
- First Nations are often on the frontlines of both climate disasters and effective conservation efforts.
