Jason Googoo – Manager, Membertou Geomatics Solutions (MGS)

Jason Googoo is the Manager of Membertou Geomatics Solutions (MGS), a Geomatics/Geographic Information Systems (GIS) solutions provider, which is owned by the community of Membertou First Nation. Jason is a Mi'kmaq from the Membertou First Nation who had graduated with honors as a Computer Programmer Analyst from the Centre of Geographic Sciences (COGS) in 2001.

As a result of this accomplishment, he was also awarded a Certificate of Achievement for “Demonstrating Excellence in the field of Science and/or Technology” by the Unama’ki Institute of Natural Resources and Georgia Pacific Inc. After graduating, he joined Dymaxion Research Ltd, a leading Information Technology company within Nova Scotia.

In 2002, Jason joined Membertou to take part of a GIS training program in which MGS evolved. Since coming back home to work for Membertou, Jason sat on Membertou’s IT committee which is responsible for the network and communications between the departments within Membertou and Halifax. Jason was also a co-chair of an IT sub-committee between Membertou and the Nova Scotia Community College (NSCC) which was responsible for developing the IT curriculum for a customized IT program within NSCC for first nation participants. Jason is also a current member of the Membertou Community Planning committee which is responsible for the design, implementation and monitoring of Membertou’s long-term community-based development plan focusing on Membertou’s community vision.

Deanna Honeyman – Lands and Property Taxation Manager

Deanna Honeyman, a member of the Sechelt Indian Band has been working with Tzeachten First Nation since September 2008. Deanna first started as their Property Taxation Administrator then adding the duties of Lands Manager in 2011.

Deanna is responsible for the comprehensive management of the Lands Program and Lands Registry relating to reserve lands under delegated authority for the Tzeachten First Nation. Deanna manages all aspects of the program including supervision of lands and property taxation staff and development of the annual departmental budget, work plans and policies and procedures.

Deanna has been an integral part of Tzeachten’s Emergency Response Program for the past 6 years, where she continuously attends training sessions and coordinates training for the community. Currently Deanna manages 12 Residential Leases, 5 Light Industrial Leases and 1 Commercial Lease consisting of over 1450 tax folios. Deanna is regularly invited to be a guest lecturer at the Tulo Center for Indigenous Economics for their First Nation Tax Administration Program. Deanna lives in Chilliwack with her husband and 2 sons and they love to take their travel trailer and drive down to Disneyland regularly.
