




Framework Agreement and Indian Act (cont.)

Why is the Framework Agreement significant?



First Nations have an inherent right to manage their reserve lands and resources and the Framework Agreement is the first real recognition of this inherent right.




















Timeline of Framework Agreement

Timeline of Framework Agreement



The Framework Agreement Signatories comprise of 1:3 First Nations across Canada

Our family currently consists of 97 communities that have ratified a land code, 36 that are active in the developmental process, 9 have chosen to be developmental – short term inactive, 23 have chosen to be inactive at this time, and 63 have expressed formal interest.



As of August 12, 2020:

Operational	94
Developmental - Active	36
Developmental - Short Term Inactive	9
Other Signatories - Voted Inactive	n
Other Signatories - Inactive	12
Self Governance	3
TOTAL	165





Amendments to Framework Agreement



Over 20 years there has been 6 significant amendments to the Framework Agreement




Overview of Amendment Process:

- LAB Directors bring forward proposed amendments
- Requires consent of Canada
- Vote by 2/3 of operational signatories
- Minister ISC presents to Parliament



Why is the Framework Agreement so Successful?



The Framework Agreement, which was developed by First Nations:


- ✓ Continues to be led by First Nations, not Canada
- ✓ Protects the title to reserve lands and resources for future generations
- ✓ Demonstrates successful and sustainable economic development
- ✓ Demonstrates that more cost effective, appropriate, and timely decision making is made by First Nation communities not Canada


