Scott Jacobs is a member of Curve Lake First Nation where his father and grandfather each served in elected positions as Chief and Councillor. Scott's family is dedicated to the pursuit of First Nations' inherent right to self-government, a legacy that Scott is proud to carry forward.

A graduate of Sir Sanford Fleming College Business Administration and Municipal Management programs, Scott spent many years in large corporations, primarily in Human Resources, management, and training roles. Before working for Georgina Island, he worked for ten years at Casino Rama and Blue Heron casinos, with five years in senior management. Scott spent many years as a small business consultant in the development and expansion of First Nation

businesses. For the last decade, Scott has worked for Chippewas of Georgina Island First Nation, most recently as the General Manager of the Island View Business Centre and the key business development person for the First Nation. The Business Centre is a multi-million-dollar operation serving over 100,000 people annually. It houses seven businesses and is a major component of the Economic Development program of the First Nation.

In addition, Scott has owned and operated Shagi Consulting Services for the last 15 years. He deals primarily with governance matters, such as elections, land codes, custom issues, and amendments ratification. He is committed to promoting an environment where First Nations can attain the financial resources needed to develop their nation to operate under their own rules and vision. This business has been involved with over 15 First Nations across Ontario as they handle their governance matters.

As a business leader within the Chippewas of Georgina Island First Nation and in conducting matters at the invitation of other First Nations, a unique insight is provided for safe operations through cooperation and teamwork of First Nation Councils, Boards, departments, personnel, and community members during the Covid 19 pandemic.

Sharon started working with the Lands Advisory Board in April 2007; working as Executive Assistant to the LAB Chairman. In April 2017, she then moved over to her current position with the Planning & Readiness team where she is the Administrative Assistant among her other duties.

Sharon is married to Ernest M. Jack (OJ), they have two adult children; Kylie who is in her final year at Simon Fraser University, majoring in Criminology and Austin is in his first year at UBCO. The family resides on the Westbank First Nation in the Syilx Territory.
